For a long while there were people that thought that Steve was living in an alternate reality when he claimed to have a wife and two. . . then three children. (I wouldn't exactly call it patiently, but since people are so nice as to credit me with that, I will accept it.)



After the family arrived on the fan scene, people wanted to know how the two of us. . . well, we're so different. Steve and I aren't sure what cosmic force got us (and keeps us) together, but. . .

It was the fall of 1982 and Pam and I had just arrived for the midnight showing of The Rocky Horror Picture Show. We were the first ones in the theater (unfortunately). We were chatting when all of a sudden "Eeeehee-hee" crackled from the back of the room. It was none other than that would-be filker, Steve. . . as a guitar toting Brad Majors. Suffice it to say that by the end of the evening I did not EVER want to meet this 'person" again in my life.

About six weeks later, I found out (to my horror) that I was dating his roommate. The roommate turned out to be not so much of a gem, but I had a chance to visit with Steve for awhile then. As it turned out, our fathers were both school administrators; in fact, they worked together as teachers during the 50's. He knew my brother from Barbershop Chorus, and he'd met my sister at some meeting at Kalamazoo College. He turned out to be a wonderful listener, and had quite a sense of (rather twisted) humor. I have to admit that I was quite fascinated with his guitar playing. He'd been at it since he was 12 or 13.

So we dated, right? No, actually he went out with a couple of my girlfriends. I ended up housemates with one of his ex's. It was almost two years later when I went to see him play at a restaurant/bar and ended up as his date. (It must have been fate.) Five months later we were engaged. Eleven months hence, we were wed. I also want you to know that for all his quirks, he's a wonderful man with a big heart, who is trying (and succeeding) to do the right things for the right reasons, and I love him for it. (Bill, I don't think I'll kill him. . . today, anyway. *Sigh*)



In 1989, Paul resumed a position with Environment Canada and the family moved to Newfoundland; they've since moved to Nova Scotia, and then New Brunswick.

Both are fine filk and folk musicians, and we are proud to have them in Canada. We think they're pretty ok friends, too! It's truly a joy to have them recognized by Interfilk for

their talent.

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Canadian Filk Preserve



The Canadian filkers have taken the northern conventions by storm over the last few years. Filk is alive and flourishing in several centers. Winnipeg is home to Dandelion Wine (with two members here), Graham Leathers, and others. The Toronto area features (in addition to your host), Karen Linsley and Lloyd Landa, Freddy Brown, Heather Borean, Urban Tapestry, and many others. The Toronto area is also home to FilkONtario and a constantly growing number of regulars to the filk scene. And quite a few of them came to visit Columbus this year (a far cry from a few years ago when Howard Scrimgeour - a former OVFF listener guest and FKO concom - was the only Canadian here).

Tom Jeffers, now of Winnipeg, Manitoba, is Dandelion Wine's "sexy bass player" and a multi-talented charter member of the "instrument of the month club". He writes wonderful songs like "Circles in the Grain" and "Dandelion Wine", plays bass, sings, and is an all-round sweetie.

Dave Clement is the heart of Winnipeg's Dandelion Wine. His abiding love for the folk music of Canada and everywhere else shines through his wonderful vocal interpretations (to be heard on his two solo and two group recordings). Claiming to be a "beginner", he plays a heckuva guitar, drums, and penny whistle. Dave is nominated in the Best Performer Pegasus category. He's a joy to have in a sing, to hang out with, and generally to be goofy with. And he gives GREAT hugs.

Paul Mac donald, of Nova Scotia via Fredericton, New Brunswick, is one of our Interfilk Guests. He plays guitar inhumanly well, writes both tender, insightful, and total groaner songs. A professional punmeister, he is decidedly punful company. That's his back-up to the vocalists on many of the OCP publications.

Catherine Mac donald, currently from Fredericton, is also one of our Interfilk Guests. Her history with filk goes back to before it was CALLED filk. Also a member of the instrument of the month club, she sings, plays guitar, and especially keyboard. We have watched her learn to play new instruments on five minutes acquaintance.

Graham Leathers is another Winnipeg resident. He's wickedly witty, plays guitar, bodhran, and a number of other items, sings, and writes truly fine material. Musically, Tom is like fine counterpoint to intricate melody; he plays (well!) many instruments including, but not limited to, bass, guitar, mandolin, cittern, penny whistle and dulcimer. 

The OVFF Songuriting Contests

The Song Writing Contest began at the second OVFF. This year we are updating the rules. There are now TWO (count them, two) different contests. In both contests the subject of the song must be appropriate to the topic (which is announced at the preceding OVFF). In the first contest, both lyrics AND music must be original. The second contest (hereafter refered to as the Lyrics Writing Contest) is for original tlyrics set to pre-existing music.

The songs are performed before the judges at OVFF. If the songwriter is not a performer, he/she may have someone else perform the song for them. (It is also permissable to enter a tape.) The songs are judged on the quality of writing and not the singer's performance.

This year's Songwriting contest topic is Anti-Ose.

This year's Lyric Writing contest topic is Parodies of Show Tunes.

Interfilk

Interfilk, a charitable organization formed under the guidance of Bob Laurent, had it's first director's meeting at Chicon V in 1991. Its purpose is to promote the exchange of filk music throughout the North American continent by providing the means and opportunity for filkers to travel to filk conventions that they normally would not be able to attend.



Funds for this sole purpose are raised through the auction of donated items -compete with campy entertainment. These auctions typically occur at filk conventions, Worldcon, and other conventions with a strong filk component. In addition, various members of the filk community have organized other fund-raising activities; many performers and songwriters have donated royalties from recordings or publications to IF. Without the generosity of those who've donated gifts, bought auction items, offered royalties, and contributed in any way, IF could not continue.

The seven directors meet and determine IF guests and their convention destinations. In general, IF pays all or

part of the travel and hotel expenses while the host convention contributes a membership and banquet ticket. The guest is asked to contribute to programming, to share their home music, and to return home to share their new-found knowledge of filk from a different environment.

Interfilk is delighted to receive suggestions for potential guests; all suggestions should be made to your local director. From the pool of nominees, IF chooses filkers who are not well known outside their own area and deserve wider exposure. They may be new and upcoming people or those how have not been recognized for their past contributions. And while IF guests are frequently performers or songwriters, listeners and organizers are also welcome nominees.

In general, filkers who have been guests at filk conventions, those who have previously appeared as IF guests, and IF directors are not eligible to be chosen.

On the much lighter side of things, I am working on several creative projects at this time. . . I'm writing a sci-fi novel about life in Glasgow (and any of you who have

been there will know what I mean. . .), I'm working on turning "The Green Gryphon" (from Swing The Cat) into a children's book with a music cassette and soft toy (it's a real challenge to re-design a gryphon into a "non-aggressive" toy. . . About Multiple Sclerosis

Between a quarter-and a half-million persons in the United States today have Multiple Sclerosis. It is not classified as a fatal ailment. Is there a cure? No. Is it contagious? No. It is unpredictable and hits people in different ways. M.S. is a chronic neurological disorder of the central nervous system - the brain and the spinal cord. The disease attacks the fatty sheath that covers nerve cells. This white fatty tissue is called the myelin sheath. MS causes one's own defense system to attack the myelin, break it down and strip it away. . . replacing the damaged area with scar tissue. Because it attacks nerves in many areas of the brain and spinal cord it is called "multiple" and "sclerosis" is another word for scarring. A person's symptoms depend upon where the attacks have taken place and nerve damage can result in anything from loss of walking ability to blindness. It also affects more complicated processes such as cognitive ability and short-term memory. Our best weapons are understanding and adaptability as well as a good sense of humor. Our best hope is the MS Society and the research that they are funding to find new drugs that will halt the progression of the disease and its disabling effects. If you wish to know more about MS, please call 1-800-LEARN MS. You can receive all kinds of up-to-date info for yourself or someone you know with the illness. And, if you are thinking of contributing to a charity this year, you might consider a donation to the MS Society so they can continue to fund research. I never thought I'd have anything in common with Annette Funicello other than mouse ears. Life is full of suprises, isn't it?
